The Rambler claim (Lot 6470) was Crown-granted to J.A. Aikins in 1906. In 1919 the Gold Bug, Rambler, Silver Star, and Silver Spoon claims were owned by W.J. Livingstone. In 1933 the property was leased by J. Flagel and associates of Ymir, constituting the Gold Bug Mining Syndicate. Messrs.
