DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT

On the claims, asbestos is found in narrow veinlets in widely spaced zones that strike northerward across a small serpentine body. The serpentine forms an irregular, elongate mass about 800 feet wide and 2,000 feet long, oriented in a north-south direction. Except for small patches of sediments on the southeast, the surrounding rock is granodiorite. Numerous thin irregular dykes of granodiorite cut the serpentine.

The asbestos is cross-fibre chrysotile. Colour varies from dark grass green to yellow green. The fibres length varies from one thirty-second of an inch to one-half inch but average one-eighth inch; one-half inch material is rare. The asbestos veinlets are generally short and pinch and swell abruptly. They occur in parallel swarms in scattered parallel zones ranging from six inches to two feet in width.

This showing is situated at about 8,000 feet elevation across the top of the ridge that separates the north fork of Walker Creek from the valley of Roxey Creek about threequarters of a mile north of Mount Penrose and three miles west of Gun Lake. Between 1951 and 1953, Mr. H. Reynolds of Lillooet staked the A.S.B. Nos. 1 and 2, P.H. and P.H. Nos. 1 to 4 claims.
