DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT
The main workings and most of the ground covered by the claims are in an area of massive andesite tuffs with minor amounts of fine volcanic breccia, all of which strike northwesterly and dip steeply northeastward. These rocks are cut in a few places by celdspar porphyry dykes up to 5 feet wide. Two main veins have been found on the property. One vein, strike N48°E and dip 70-80° IW, was explored underground for 500 feet on strike and 400 feet vertically. The other vein, strike N32°E and dip 80°NW was explored underground for 160 feet on strike. The veins range in midth from a knife-edge to 3 feet, but widths less than 1 foot are he more common. Most of the vein quartz is massive, but some of t is ribboned by streaks of fine-grained sulphides. The sulphides nclude principally pyrite, galena, and sphalerite, but occasion-11y large patches of massive arsenopyrite and pyrrhotite are ound.

HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT

The property is located on the southeast side of the Zeballos River about 3 mile southwest of the Privateer Mine and 21 miles north-northeast of Zeballos.

The property was staked in 1933 by R.A. Pitre and associates, subsequent principals of Nootka-Zeballos Gold Mines, Limited. The property consisted of 7 claims, the Van Isle 1-2, Blue Ox 1-2, Wolverine, Pedro, and Silver Bear, held under the name Nootka Gold Mining Syndicate. Underground exploration work began in 1935. Nootka-Zeballos Gold Mines, Limited, was incorporated in January 1937 to acquire this and the hearby Privateer property. The company incorporated Man O'War Mines Limited in November 1937 to develop the Van Isle group. Some of the original claims were apparently restaked in 1937 and 1938 as the V.I. 1-4, Cascade No. 2, Blue Ox Fraction, and Hay Fraction. The company name, Nootka-Zeballos, was changed in December 1937 to Privateer Mine, Limited. The claims were Crown-granted to Privateer Mine, Limited, in 1940. Considerable underground work was done in 1937 and 1939. The workings consist of 3 adits, 1,800 west, 1,800 east, and 2,000 levels, a sublevel between 1,800 and 2,000 adits driven on the main vein, and a drift on the 2,000 adit driven on the second vein. A raise was driven from the 2,000 adit to the sublevel and to the 1,800 east, and a stope has been excavated on 1,800 east.

The company name was changed in 1959 to New Privateer Mine Limited.

HISTORY OF PRODUCTION

In 1940, 3,100 tons of ore were shipped from this property. From this ore 1,178 ounces of gold and 540 ounces of silver were recovered.
