DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT

The placer gold occurs in benches which extend upstream George Creek from its mouth at Willow River.

HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT

George Creek flows northeast for about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles to meet the Willow River 27 miles southeast of Prince George.

The first leases were held by A.J. Hurtubise in 1927, and he worked the leases for the next few years.

The property was worked sporadically by others, including J. Lahay, until 1962.

HISTORY OF PRODUCTION

Recorded production up to and including 1945 totals 47 oz. of placer gold recovered from George Creek.
