DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT

The underlying rocks are entirely volcanic, consisting of alternating and semi-bedded flows of rhyolite, andesite, diabase, and porphyrites. A shattered zone, striking northerly, contains numerous veinlets of quartz only a few inches wide and separated from one another generally by a distance of several feet. Some of the veinlets show considerable feldspar, forming a pegmatite, and may in reality be igneous dykes. Some of the veinlets show a little tetrahedrite.

On the Gipsy Queen a vein or dyke of decomposed talcy material from 4 to 6 feet wide shows a few specks of bornite. An outcrop sample assayed: Gold, trace; silver, 1.2 ounces per ton; copper, nil.

HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT

The claims are reported to be located: "on the west side of the mountain on the west side of Hunter Basin, on the slope into Glacier Creek".

The Hannah group, comprising the H. & O. and W.J. claims, was staked in 1912 by Mark Hannah and James Oberholtzer. A crosscut adit being driven in 1914 had a length of 65 feet at the time of inspection.

The adjoining Gipsy Queen and Blue Grouse claims were owned by Paddy Quinn and partner. The workings on these claims included open cuts, and 2 adits 20 and 30 feet in length.
