DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT/DESCRIPTION DU GISEMENT

The country rock is augite porphyry. The main showing is a vein 1 to 8 feet wide, but mainly less than 3 feet wide, which lies in a sheared and shattered zone striking northeasterly across the fork of Glacier Creek. The vein dips about 80° northwest and has been traced for 800 feet on the northeast side and for 600 feet on the southwest side of the creek. Open cuts exposed vein matter consisting of quartz, siderite, pyrite, galena, sphalerite and tetrahedrite. High grade ore was found locally at the surface but no ore shoots have been definitely outlined. The ore found underground was considerably lower in grade.

HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT
HISTORIQUE DE L'EXPLORATION ET DE LA MISE EN VALEUR

This property is located at the 2,500 foot elevation on the south branch of the middle fork of Glacier Cree, about 5 miles northeast of Stewart. The L. & L. property lies to the northeast and adjoining.

The Columbia claim is located on the south side of the creek, and the Evening Sun claim is located directly across the creek. The Silver King claim adjoins the Evening Sun on the northeast. The Last Chance claims of Union Silver Mines adjoined the Columbia claim on the west.

The Columbia (Lot 411) and Evening Sun (Lot 1517) claims were located in 1905 by Messrs. Rush and Baggs and exploration work was carried on in several adits; the claims were Crown-granted in 1920. The Silver King claim (Lot 1388) was located in about 1905 by Andrew Nelson and was Crown-granted in 1912.

Lordigordy Mine, Limited, formed in July 1910, optioned the Columbia, Evening Sun, and Lallapalooser claims. Intermittent exploration work was continued in several adits on the Columbia and Evening Sun claims. The company charter was surrendered in 1914.

Owners Rush and Baggs resumed work on the Columbia and Evening Sun in 1919. Rush-Columbia Mines, Limited, W.W. Rush, President, was formed in April 1925 to acquire 2 groups of claims, the Columbia and Gem. The Columbia group included the Columbia, Evening Sun, Nonesuch, Summit Fraction, Sentinel and Salient Fraction. The Gem group included the Gem, Gem Extension, Al-Ki, and Mother Lode Fraction. Little work was done due to litigation and control of the company changed hands in 1926. A consolidation of the Columbia and L. & L. properties was made in 1926 under L. & L. Consolidated Mines, Limited. Surface and underground exploration work was done on the Columbia property in 1927 and 1928. The company charter was surrendered in 1948.

Union Silver Mines, Limited, which was formed in March 1925, acquired the Last Chance Nos.1-3 claims from D. Kimball and C.F. Harrison. An adit was driven 80 feet on a small fracture but no mineralization was found. The company charter was surrendered in 1928.

Exploration work on the Evening Sun and Columbia claims has been done in open cuts and in 3 or more adits. An adit on the Evening Sun claim was driven over 100 feet. The upper adit on the Columbia claim was driven as a crosscut for 50 feet and

HISTORY OF PRODUCTION/HISTORIQUE DE LA PRODUCTION

Recorded production, listed under Lordigordy (Evening Sun), and Evening Star, for shipments made in the years 1910 and 1913, totals 11 tons. From this ore 1 ounce of gold, 2,523 ounces of silver, 135 pounds of copper and 3,982 pounds of lead were recovered. (Index No. 3 to Publications of the British Columbia Dept. of Mines).

drift for 250 feet. The lower adit, about 175 feet below the upper, was driven as a crosscut and drift for over 100 feet.

The Columbia, L. & L. and Sunshine properties were acquired by purchase for taxes by L.H. Davidson, of Stewart, in about 1934. The combined holdings were known as the Ida group. No work was reported on the Columbia property at this time.
