DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT

The claim is underlain by Jurassic volcanics intruded by granitic rocks of the Coast Range intrusions. The main mineral occurrence consists of a stockwork about 600 feet wide of irregular lenticular masses, veins, and stringers of quartz in altered hornblende-schist. The general strike of this is about NlO°E (mag.). The widest development of quartz is about 70 feet. In one place a few small isolated bunches of chalco-pyrite occur.

About 600 feet west of this showing at elevation 1,300 feet a sugar-quartz 10 to 12 feet wide has been traced about 500 feet, striking N20°W (mag.) and dipping steeply west, in altered andesite. A felsite dyke lies in close proximity to the east wall. The only mineralization observed is a stringer about 1 inch wide and 2 feet long on the hanging-wall, carrying some molybdenite.

## HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT

The claim is located in Granby Bay, Observatory Inlet, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile southwest of the mouth of Bonanza Creek.

The Black Bear group, comprising one claim and two fractions, was reportedly owned in 1930 by S.W. Barclay, of Anyox. The Black Bear claim (Lot 3338) was listed as Crown-granted to R.Y. Ingraham in 1930. Stripping was reported in 1931.
