DESCRIPTION OF DEPOSIT/DESCRIPTION DU GISEMENT

The upper part of the mountain is diorite, intrusive into a thick series of limestones. The principal showing is a quartz vein in the diorite, striking east-west nearly parallel to the contact and 200 to 300 feet north of it. The vein dips north into the diorite. The total width of the lead, including the mineralized diorite, is from 5 to 7 feet with individual quartz veins varying in width from 1 to 4 feet over a length of 1,500 feet. In the main showing 3 distinct quartz veins are separated by a few inches to a foot of slightly pyritized diorite. The quartz veins are mineralized with a very small amount of pyrite. Assays of the vein quartz range from 0.10 to 0.3 ounces gold per ton but an occasional higher assay has been obtained.

HISTORY OF EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT HISTORIQUE DE L'EXPLORATION ET DE LA MISE EN VALEUR

This property is located between elevations of 4,100 and 4,600 feet on steep valley walls north of Jarvis Glacier and about 4 miles west of Pleasant Camp, near the B.C.-Alaska boundary.

The showings were discovered and the Stampede group of claims staked by J.O. Stenbraten in 1915. The Alaska Juneau Gold Mining Company optioned the property in 1928 and exploration work was carried on into 1929 when the option was dropped.

In 1930 the showings were restaked by W. Bunting as the Gold Chord Nos. 1-8 claims and the Yellow Jacket claim. The last reported work on the property was in 1931. The showings have been explored by over 30 open cuts and 7 shafts.
